



On Tuesday of this week word came that His Grace, the Archbishop will celebrate the Diaconate Ordination Mass for Bro Illtyd M. on Friday 27th December at 12 noon here at the Oratory. A man must be ordained to the Order of Deacon before he can be ordained to the Order of Priest. I take this opportunity to thank Archbishop O'Toole unreservedly and to ask you the faithful of this Parish to now pray especially for Bro Illtyd M as he prepares for this extremely important moment on his journey to the Sacred Priesthood.

On Wednesday of this week it was confirmed by our solicitor that the transfer of ownership had taken place of the Oratory House, St Alban's Church and St Alban's Parish Hall from the Rosminian Trust to the Cardiff Oratory Trust. The properties are now owned for the permanent mission of the Cardiff Oratory here in St Alban's Parish. I wish to record the Oratorian community's profound gratitude to His Grace, the Archbishop for enabling the transfer of the properties to take place, thus ensuring the canonical stability required of an Oratory in this pastoral mission. I wish also to record our the immense gratitude to the Vicar General, Fr Brian Gray who has been so supportive of the process. Without the immense generosity of a family of the Parish this purchase from the Rosminians of the Oratory House for £200,000:00 and also their legal costs would not have been possible. The Oratory and Parishioners owe these benefactors an enormous debt of gratitude in securing the property permanently for the future well-being of St Alban's Parish. It is in profound gratitude to Almighty God for His great mercy

shown to us, the solicitude of the Archbishop and Fr Brian and for the sacrifices made to bring this moment about that the great hymn *Te Deum* will be sung this Sunday at 11:00am.

Te Deum

(English translation)

We praise Thee, O God: we acknowledge Thee to be the Lord. All the earth doth worship Thee, the Father everlasting. To Thee all Angels cry aloud: the Heavens and all the powers therein. To Thee Cherubim and Seraphim continually do cry, Holy, Holy, Holy: Lord God of Sabaoth; Heaven and earth are full of the Majesty of Thy Glory. The glorious company of the Apostles praise Thee. The godly fellowship of the Prophets praise Thee. The noble army of Martyrs praise Thee. The holy Church throughout all the world doth acknowledge Thee; The Father of an infinite Majesty; Thine honourable, true, and only Son; Also the Holy Ghost: the Comforter. Thou art the King of Glory, O Christ. Thou art the everlasting Son of the Father. When Thou tookest upon Thee to deliver man: Thou didst not abhor the Virgin's womb. When Thou hadst overcome the sharpness of death, Thou didst open the Kingdom of Heaven to all believers. Thou sittest at the right hand of God in the glory of the Father. We believe that Thou shalt come to be our Judge. We therefore pray Thee, help Thy servants whom Thou hast redeemed with Thy precious blood. Make them to be numbered with Thy Saints in glory everlasting. **O** Lord, save Thy people: and bless Thine heritage. Govern them and lift them up for ever. Day by day we magnify Thee; and we worship Thy Name, ever world without end. Vouchsafe, O Lord, to keep us this day without sin. O Lord, have mercy upon us. O Lord, let Thy mercy lighten upon us: as our trust is in Thee. O Lord, in Thee have I trusted: let me never be confounded.

The refurbishment of the old

insulation in the tower of the church is now complete. It is hoped that the loss of heat through the "chimney effect" of the disintegrated insulation in the tower will be noticeable this winter (but do not put on the Hawaii shirts for Mass quite yet..)



Disintegrated insulation has been replaced with materials that allow the building to breath as well as insulate.

The Insurance company informed me on Friday afternoon that the insurance premium for St Alban's Church, Oratory House and Parish Hall for 2024-2025 will be £13,000.00. This is a considerable increase in the premium and seems to result from concerns as to the absence of an integrated smoke and fire alarm



system for the church, house and hall. It is the first time such an expectation has been required, but as we know legislation is changing all the time.

Books Woof I Have Read

Monday, 21 October 2024, is Trafalgar Day, and will mark the

219th anniversary of the great sea battle which took place off the coast of Cape Trafalgar in 1805. So, this week, I thought I would read '*Trafalgar*: *An Eye-Witness History*', by Tom Pocock, which is a skilfully-edited compilation of letters, diary entries and other primary sources written by those involved in the battle on both sides. The Battle of Trafalgar was one of the most important engagements in British history. Indeed, according to his biographer, Ian Ker, seeing the candles which people had placed in their windows on the eve of the battle in solidarity with the nation's sailors was the earliest memory of the four-year-old John Henry Newman.

As every schoolboy knows, Trafalgar ended Napoleon's dream of invading Britain. However, it also forced Napoleon to resort to a policy of trying to blockade Britain (known as the Continental System), which created tension between Napoleon and his allies (especially Russia, which relied upon trade with Britain). Eventually, that led to a showdown between Napoleon and the Russian Tsar, Alexander I, and resulted both in the disastrous French retreat from Moscow in the winter of 1812 and, ultimately, the end of Napoleon's career.


The many documents assembled in this book provide fascinating insights into every aspect of the battle, from Nelson's own genius down to the many hardships and immense bravery of the ordinary men, who continued fighting in the most horrendous of conditions.

The book also provides one with a clear understanding of how Nelson won the battle. He had only 27 ships of the line, compared to the combined French & Spanish force of 33. However, Nelson knew that he had the better gunners and that, if he could engage the enemy in closequarter fighting (known as 'pell-mell'), he would have the advantage.

To achieve this, Nelson abandoned the conventional method of fighting a sea battle, with each line of ships sailing alongside one another firing broadsides. Instead, he split his fleet into two lines and then approached the enemy at a right angle, intersecting the enemy line at points which were roughly one-third and two-thirds along (a tactic which became known as 'breaking the line').

This revolutionary idea left the leading British ships (HMS Victory and HMS Royal Sovereign) extremely vulnerable on the long and slow approach toward the enemy; but, once they encountered the enemy fleet, the advantage swung in their favour. The front third of the enemy fleet was left sailing away from the battle and was effectively neutralised. Meanwhile, the British ships cutting through the remaining enemy line were able to fire from both sides simultaneously: one side into the stern of the ship on their port side and one into the bow of the ship on their starboard side. Such devastating broadsides, fired at relatively close quarters, 'raked' the entire enemy ship from one end to the other, and did incredible damage.

One by one, the enemy ships surrendered. Eventually, at 5:45 pm, the French ship *Achille* exploded, taking 480 souls with her. That ended the battle. By then, however, Nelson was already dead, having been struck by a musket ball earlier in the afternoon, but he did live long enough to learn that the battle was won. As he lay dying, Britain's greatest admiral was heard to murmur, "Thank God I have done my duty." It was a tribute to him – and all who have laid down their lives for their country – that he made the supreme sacrifice so willingly. This splendid book is a fitting memorial to their heroism.
