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# ST DAVID'S DAY

St David (*Dewi Sant* in the Welsh language) was Bishop of Menevia and Confessor. He is Patron Saint of <u>Wales</u>. Usually represented standing on a little hill, with a dove on his shoulder. He is commemorated on 1 March. The earliest mention of him is found in the tenth-century <u>manuscript</u> *Annales Cambriae*<sup>"</sup>, which assigns his death to A.D. 601. Born at Henvynyw (Vetus-Menevia) in Cardiganshire. He was prominent at the Synod of Brevi in Cardiganshire, which was an important Roman military station, Loventium. Shortly afterwards, in 569, he presided over another <u>synod</u> held at a place called Lucus Victoriae. He was Bishop of <u>Menevia</u>, the Roman port Menapia in Pembrokeshire, later known as St. David's, then the chief point of departure for <u>Ireland</u>. St. David was <u>canonized</u> by <u>Pope Callistus II</u> in the year 1120.

# 20% +

Lent is the time when every Catholic is called by Christ to consider his or her own personal response to Christ's invitation "Follow Me". The call is God's grace, our individual response is discipleship/stewardship. In the first moment it is a spiritual conversion *metanoia*- repentance. Then this action necessarily becomes corporal - social. Social not only in the sense of Poor Box Giving and Missions, SPUC, etc, but social as in the duty and responsibility of every adult Catholic man and woman to support their Parish.

At the beginning of Advent 2024 I mentioned that there was need for a 20%+ increase in parishioner's individual weekly giving to support the Parish to maintain the present momentum of restoration work, H&S upgrading, ordinary building maintenance, insurances on the properties, rates, heating, support for the Parish School and the Archdiocesan Levy. This expenditure is largely statutory, and that is mentioned before the requirements for the worthy celebration of Mass and the Sacraments and the requirements of the Church's ceremonies and distinct seasons. In terms of Parish housekeeping as the Parish Priest and your own housekeeping is a of course a question of scale. In August 2025 the Oratory has been at St Alban's for 6 years. In that time a "tight rein" has been kept on all spending, in the domestic life of the Fathers and Brothers and the Parish so as to ensure that no false economies are adopted with the short-termism of "buy cheap, pay twice". I hope that we can all appreciate that monies raised and legacies received and spent in accordance with their stated purposes have always had the concern to restore and build now with the future in mind. So many visitors to St Alban's marvel at the vibrance of the Parish in its richness of families and sense of Cardiff history.

As your Parish Priest I am well aware of the financial restraints upon every parishioner. I see first-hand how almost every week the money set aside for food shopping brings less and less to the table. Likewise the utility companies seem to have a license to extort money, and as we know, heating one's home should not be considered a luxury or a perk of an already well paid job.

Therefore, in order to increase *your own* individual weekly giving to the Parish <u>without</u> having to give a penny more, I ask every adult Parishioner to sign up to the Weekly Giving Envelopes or Online Planned Giving. The Oratory as a registered charity can claim 20% on all such planned giving, and there are no administration costs to eat into that sum. Planned Giving is confidential and governed by the laws on data protection. All that is required is that the person whose name is on the box is a tax payer.

The present giving envelopes will soon succeeded with 2025-2026 envelopes. I ask that you return the Planned Giving Form to the Parish Priest as soon as possible. He will be happy to answer any individual questions you may have. and

I shall be signing up myself for the planned giving envelopes, to show that however small one's income may be, we are all called as individuals to give an account of our stewardship. It was St John Henry Newman who noted on this matter: "Give back some of God's gifts to God, that you may safely enjoy the rest." In signing up, you will greatly assist your Fr Sebastian M as your Parish Priest and remove from him the burden and anxiety of being confronted with increasing expenditure and static giving. # Books Woof I Have Read

This week, I read '*The Stripping of the Altars: Traditional Religion in England,* 1400-1580, by Eamon Duffy.

Duffy is emeritus professor of the History

of Christianity at the University of Cambridge. In this work, which was first published in 1992, he looks at popular religion in England before, during and after the various upheavals of the sixteenth century. The book is split into two parts. The first provides an extremely detailed (one might even say 'forensic') analysis of popular religion from 1400 until the eve of the Henrician Reformation. Duffy examines every available source, such as (surviving) church architecture, Wills, and surviving accounts of events both local and national.

The depth of research is so detailed and painstaking that it can be very dry. However, by the end of it, one is left with a clear sense of the experience of the Catholic Faith enjoyed by ordinary people up and down the country before Henry VIII and his henchmen rode roughshod over centuries of tradition. The second part of the book looks, in turn, at the remainder of the reign of Henry VIII (that is from the calling of the so-called Reformation Parliament in 1529 until the king's death in January 1547); the reign of Edward VI (1547 to 1553); the attempts to restore traditional religion under Mary (1553 to 1558); and, finally, the first 22 years of Elizabeth's reign (1558 to 1580).

It is striking how much depended upon the personality, beliefs and ideas of the individual monarch. For example, Henry VIII's appetite for (and willingness to countenance) change waxed and waned over the final years of his reign, meaning that the 'message' from the top of government was not always consistent. Edward's regime, on the other hand, was whole-heartedly committed to a degree of reform which far exceeded anything Henry would have entertained. In many ways, Duffy's examination of Mary's reign is one of the most interesting part of the book. First, he is able to demonstrate that the previous 24 years of reform had not been enough to extinguish the flame of popular Catholicism in England and that, far from being an unpopular reactionary, Mary was (in many respects, at least) pushing at an open door. Second, Mary was nothing like as dogmatic as is sometimes suggested, and was realistic enough to appreciate that the clock could not simply be turned back to 1529 (for example, she could not simply strip the gentry of the monastic lands and return them to the religious houses which had been dissolved).

When one reaches Elizabeth's reign, it becomes obvious that it was the so-called Elizabethan Settlement which determined the religion of England more than anything which had gone before. If Elizabeth had been a Catholic – that is, if she had continued Mary's work - it is very likely that this would have been the end of Protestant reforms in England. However, the fact that Mary reigned for just 5 years, whereas Elizabeth, a Protestant, reigned for 45 years, meant that, by the time Elizabeth died in 1603, the fervent adherents to the 'Old Religion' had largely died out. It must be said that much of this book does not make for easy-reading. That is it because it is a very detailed, academic work. However, it does challenge many of the popular myths about the English Reformation: that it was largely welcomed by most people, that it somehow set them free from the servitude of medieval Catholicism, and that the eventual outcome was a foregone If you have an interest in the history of conclusion. Catholicism in this country then this book is well worth reading.



**LENT** (the word "Lent" comes from the Old English "lencten," meaning "springtime) lasts from Ash Wednesday to the Vespers of Holy Saturday -- forty days, never minding the six Sundays which don't count as "Lent" Liturgically. The Latin name for Lent, Quadragesima, means forty and refers to the forty days Christ spent in the desert which is the origin of the Season. The last two weeks of Lent are known as "Passiontide," made up of Passion Week (which begins and Holy Week (which begins on The last three days of Holy Week are known as the "Sacred Triduum." The focus of Lent is the Cross and penance, penance as we imitate Christ's forty days of fasting, like Moses and Elias before Him, and await the triumph of Easter. We fast, abstain, mortify the flesh, give alms, and think more of charitable works. Awakening each
