Last day for Lenten Alms in the form of tins or dry food donations under the Calvary is Tuesday of Holy Week




## **LENT '2025**

**LATEST NEWS: Restoration Work** 

"Parish Stewardship: Our Task"

£25,000 has now been paid against the invoice for Phase 3 of the Restoration works (28.3.25). The invoice was for £59,861.47. The outstanding amount is £34,861.47 On Thursday it was confirmed that our applications to reclaim VAT on all unclaimed recent restoration works had been successful. We were advised that we should receive a reimbursement of £26,535.52. This means that the Oratory Parish fundraising for the present drainage and pathway works is £8,325.95.

# Books Woof I Have Read by Pippo

This week I read 'Rubicon: The Triumph & Tragedy of the Roman Republic', by Tom Holland.

First published in 2003, this book tells the story of the final years of the Roman Republic and the emergence of the empire. Holland himself has said that he would have liked to have been able to call the book 'Citizens', but was unable to do so, of course, because the historian Simon Schama had already used that title in 1989 for his outstanding work on the French Revolution.

In the end, Holland named the book after the small river in Northern Italy which Julius Caesar famously crossed with his legions in 49 BC, thereby invading the republic and plunging it into the four years of civil war which resulted in Caesar becoming dictator for life. As it happened, that life did not last very much longer because Caesar was assassinated in 44 BC, once again plunging Rome into a civil war. It was easy to see why this book received such acclaim, and won the Hessell-Tiltman Prize in 2004. The subject matter is fascinating and the prose is extremely readable. The result is a book which is both interesting and entertaining. One of the things which caught my particular attention was Holland's consideration of the way in which, having been through two civil wars, the Roman people welcomed the eventual peace and prosperity which Augustus gave them and which was perpetuated by his successor, Tiberius. The fact that both men were dictators was a price most seemed willing to pay, especially since the majority had felt largely disenfranchised under the republic anyway. Most were content with 'bread and circuses'. The point struck me because it echoed what I read only recently about the Weimar Republic. Time and again through history, societies which have been brought to their knees by conflict have made the mistake of thinking that democracy is incompatible with peace and prosperity; and that only a dictatorship can put things right. Whilst strong leadership will certainly help to get a country back on its feet, it is only a matter of time before the absence of democracy makes itself felt.

This was a compelling story, told skilfully, and I have no hesitation in recommending it.
