The monthly Coffee Morning takes place this week which includes the 200 club draw and a few games of Bingo.

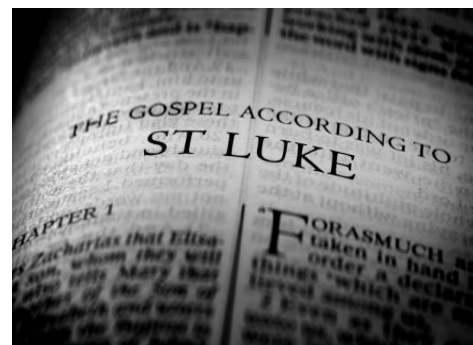

Pope Leo XIV MAGNIFICA HUMANITAS

Pope Leo argues in this chapter that the rapid development of artificial intelligence and digital technologies must be guided by the principles of the Church's Social Doctrine, ensuring that technological progress always serves the dignity of the human person rather than economic efficiency alone.

The Holy Father first examines the relationship between truth and democracy, warning that AI can amplify misinformation, blur the distinction between truth and falsehood, and weaken public trust. Truth is presented as a common good that must be sought through reason, dialogue, and responsible communication. Digital platforms should therefore promote transparency, critical thinking, and respect for human dignity rather than manipulation or ideological control. Education plays a central role in this task, helping young people develop discernment, patience, and wisdom instead of dependence upon instant technological answers. Schools, families, governments, and Christian communities are called to form an educational alliance that encourages responsible use of digital technologies while protecting children from exploitation, addiction, and harmful online content.

The encyclical then considers the impact of AI on work. While automation can relieve people of dangerous or repetitive labour, it must never undermine the dignity of workers or treat human beings as expendable. Employment is described as essential to personal fulfilment, family stability, and social cohesion. Governments, businesses, and labour organisations must therefore cooperate to protect employment, provide retraining, and ensure that technological innovation benefits everyone rather than enriching only a privileged minority. Economic success should be measured not solely by profit or GDP but by justice, inclusion, environmental stewardship, and the flourishing of workers and families.

Finally, Pope Leo warns against new forms of digital dependency, surveillance, and modern slavery hidden within technological supply chains. It condemns human trafficking, exploitative labour, and the misuse of personal data, while calling for transparency, ethical regulation, and international cooperation. The concluding message is that technology is neither inherently good nor evil: it becomes truly beneficial only

when directed towards truth, the common good, solidarity, and the inviolable dignity of every human person

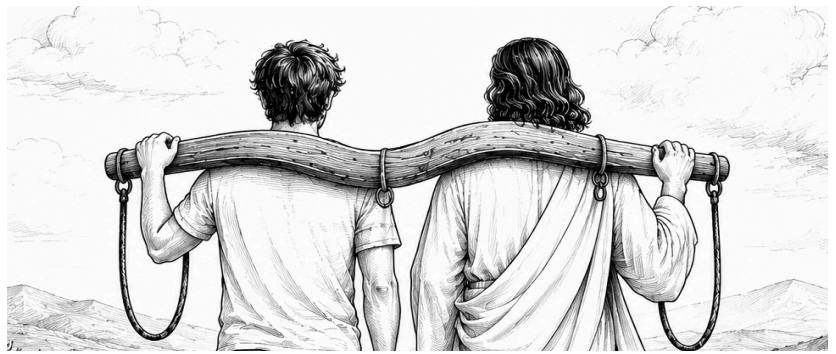

In the Gospel this weekend, Jesus invites us: “Take my yoke upon you and learn from me” (Matthew 11:29). A yoke was a wooden beam placed across two oxen so that they could work together, sharing the weight of the load. It also became a symbol of accepting the teaching and way of life of a master. Our Lord uses this familiar image to invite us to follow Him. Unlike the heavy burdens imposed by sin, Christ’s yoke is “easy” because He carries it with us. He does not promise a life without difficulties, but He does promise His grace, strength, and companionship. When we entrust our lives to Him, our burdens become lighter because we no longer carry them alone. As we learn from His gentleness and humility, we discover the peace that only He can give and find true “rest for our souls.”
